


2014/15 Annual Report

The death of a loved one through drug or alcohol addiction can have a devastating impact on the lives of families and friends. The Bristol and SW Bereavement through Addiction Group is working to raise awareness of the problems people are facing and to set up services to help alleviate their suffering.











BTA Support Group Support for Family & Friends

The most key aspect of the work of BTA is the Support Group. It takes place on alternate Wednesday from 7pm at the Bristol Drugs Project in Brunswick Square.

Joan and Paul continue to contribute a lot of time and energy into providing a safe and contained space for family and friends who have lost loved ones as a result of addiction.

The Group is open for people across the South West and has even seen people attend from overseas. There are a core group of attendees and membership continues to grow.

Often telephone support is also given to people prior to them coming into the group setting and many contacts are made via the website.

Group members are actively encouraged to express

feelings and support each other. There is a focus on positive movement through the grieving process – always understanding that each person experiences loss in their own way.

We have found that a group setting is a powerful tool for healing. People soon feel safe and are able to express all their feelings – from sadness to anger to laughter – knowing they are safe and that there will always be somebody that can identify.

The Group has helped BTA to achieve some of its core objectives including:

Dealing with stigma
Raising awareness
Improving quality of life

Research Project

From September 2012 for 3 years Joan will be working with researchers at the Centre for Death and Society at the University of Bath in collaboration with addiction studies' researchers from the Universities of Stirling and Glasgow on a research project that is being funded by the Economic and Social Research Council (ESRC). The research will investigate and raise awareness of the impact on bereaved family members of losing a loved one to drug or alcohol

misuse. To achieve this, the researchers are interviewing 100 bereaved family members and, on the basis of what they say about their experiences, go on to work with addiction and bereavement service providers and users to develop a set of practice guidelines to assist those who work to support this group of bereaved people.
